FROM THE PASTOR

The Rev. Peter J. Gomes was an American Baptist minister who served at Harvard University as a professor and its chief pastor from 1974 until his death in 2011. In a Christmas Day sermon, he wrote:

"I have never been to the Holy Land. I hope someday to go, and of all the things I would like to see, I would most like to see the oldest church in Christendom, which stands on what is believed to be the site of the nativity in Bethlehem, the Church of the Holy Nativity. It was considered old in Constantine's time, and in its cavelike crypt beneath the high altar where the seven lamps burn eternally is found the place where it is believed that Mary bore her son. It is the most sacred spot of our faith, and both the sacredness and the space are important, for they remind us of the tangible quality of the Incarnation."

Sermons: Biblical Wisdom for Daily Living (1998), p. 24.

I don't know if Peter Gomes ever made it to the Holy Land, but Susan and I expect to be there next month. It has been a dream of mine for a long time, but how it came about surprised us.

Last June, an old friend showed up unannounced. Tony told me that he and a mutual friend, Lee, were going to the Holy Land in February on a tour led by Lee's daughter, who is an ELCA pastor. Tony said, "You and Susan ought to go." Now here we are, only a little over a month removed from our trip. We'll spend three nights on the western shore of the Sea of Galilee in Tiberias, and six nights in Bethlehem. This will afford us time during the day to see many of the famous sites, including the Church of the Holy Nativity. Thanks to our Council's generosity of spirit, I will be having a sabbatical in 2019. This trip is the first item on my agenda.

It will be Epiphany when Susan and I are in the Holy Land. I expect to be steeped in what Gomes called "the tangible quality of the Incarnation" while we are there. We will be reminded over and over that this holy place is where Jesus was born, walked through Judea and Galilee, taught, healed, and worked miracles. This is where the Christ was crucified, buried, resurrected, and ascended into heaven.

Having shared the good news of Jesus' love for the world for over forty years as a pastor, it seems fitting that I finally should go to where the gospel itself began - and the literature in the Hebrew Bible before that, and its oral tradition many years before that. I wonder how it will impact how I share Jesus' message in the future?

Merry Christmas, happy New Year, and a joyous Epiphany to you!

FROM THE ASSOCIATE PASTOR

Addiction and the Opioid Crisis: A Community Education Panel Tuesday, January 29 7:00 p.m. in Pearson Hall

Over the last couple of years, the opioid crisis has become a more and more regular feature of our daily news. But for too many of us addiction and its effects are not just news headlines; they are painful experiences in our lives or in the lives of people we love. As someone recently told me, the opioid crisis doesn't discriminate. It affects people of all ages, economic status, education – you name it. According to the TN Department of Health, opioid overdoses claimed the lives of 1,268 Tennesseans in 2017, and at least 24 of those were in Williamson County. The numbers climb higher every year. This national crisis has broken the hearts of families right here at St. Andrew.

Seeking to embody Christ's healing and attention to those who suffer, this month St. Andrew will be offering our community a chance to learn more about issues related to addiction and the opioid crisis. A panel of experts from within our congregation will share information from their own experiences and professional perspectives, hoping to cover the basic scope of the opioid crisis; its effects on individuals, families, and communities; and the changes being made to help. This panel will include Laura McElroy (PharmD, BCPS), a clinical staff pharmacist at Maury Regional Medical Center; Anne Fottrell (MD), a psychiatrist; Jeff Moseley (JD), an attorney specializing in health care law and president of 21st District Recovery Court; Jane Franks (JD), a judge in the juvenile court system; and Victor Hundt, who lost his son to an overdose. The panel will also provide a list of resources for people struggling with addiction and their families.

We plan to advertise this event widely, inviting the surrounding community to come and learn more about addiction and the opioid crisis. Please invite those you think would benefit from this event, and contact me if you would like copies of our advertising materials to distribute.

Fast forward to that congregation's twenty-fifth anniversary. I was there with several former pastors leading the festival worship service. I was distributing communion when a young man knelt at the altar rail with a woman and two small children. "Pastor," he whispered, "I'm Bobby. Remember me?" Indeed, I remembered Bobby, this time accompanied by his wife and two small children. What a joy it was for me to know that he was still a presence in that congregation after so many years. Perhaps something I said or did led to his continuing relationship with that congregation. I cannot be certain.

Each week a host of visitors come our way. We never know what sort of impression we are making on them. Don't assume that what you say or how you act is unimportant. People are making decisions about St. Andrew from the moment they get out of their cars in the parking lot. Those decisions of whether or not to continue as a part of the St. Andrew family are firmed up as they interact with those of us already settled into our comfortable pews.

It has been a blessing for us over the years to be a welcoming community to so many people from so many different places. Each of them has had a unique story, but sometimes their stay with us has been too brief for us to come to know their stories in full. FROM THE ADMINSTRATION COMMITTEE

Over the past year and half, the Administration Committee has studied threatening or active shooter situations in regard to our church building. We met with the Sheriff's office for assessment of our facility and with Lt. Rick Clouse of the Franklin Police Department for a safety seminar with the congregation.

The following article is from a temple talk presented to the congregation at worship on Sunday, December 9 by Jolene Richardson and Jeff Moseley.

"An apology for the serious topic but it was just a little over a year ago on November 4 when a gunman entered a small, rural Texas church, shot, and killed 26 people.

Unfortunately, there have been many incidents where shooters targeted malls, schools, concerts, clubs, and churches to name a few. While we don't believe this would happen at St. Andrew, we do want the congregation to be as prepared as possible.

Obviously we aren't going to cover much in a 3-4 minute temple talk but we want to share basic information from a recent meeting at St. Andrew by Lt. Rick Clouse of the Franklin Police Department.

This information can be applied to any place you and your family are:

- Be aware of your surroundings. For any emergency situation, know where the exits are. Do you know where the exit doors are in the church?
- Establish a meeting place with your family in case of an emergency.
- Establish a secret code word with your family that tells them to get out or run or this is an emergency situation!
- If you hear fireworks or something that sounds like fireworks, it ISN'T fireworks, unless you are at a firework show.

- RUN if you hear or see anything. DO NOT hesitate or try to take anything with you. RUN!
- If you can't run, HIDE. Don't play dead but hide. It is better to RUN but if you can't run, HIDE or DENY. Deny by making a barricade if possible.
- FIGHT FIGHT ONLY if you are willing to do what is necessary.
- Last but very important COMPLY with law enforcement. If you are in a situation, do exactly as the law enforcement ask. Do not take strong orders personally. Law enforcement comes in on a situation and has to assess quickly so you need to do exactly as you are told.

Other important pieces of information you can do as a family:

- 1. Teach your children to memorize your names (parents, grandparents, guardians), their address, and phone numbers with area codes.
- 2. Teach your children the police are there to help them.

In addition to these practical suggestions, the Administrative Committee will continue to bring ideas or recommendations to the Council concerning ways to make our Church safer. We have had an inspection by members of the Williamson County Sheriff's Department and they generally gave us a "thumbs up." Now we will be looking at ways to improve. Those may be ways to lock Sunday School doors quickly to impede access, they may be cameras for monitoring activity on the property or they may involve some form of security personnel. We will continue to talk about those ideas and we will continue to talk to the congregation as we go. We know that we don't have unlimited resources. We know that we want to remain a welcoming place for visitors seeking the Good News. We also believe that we have an obligation to work within those constraints to make our church as safe as possible.

One idea that the committee would like to pursue is the establishment of a Safety Committee. We would like volunteers to form the committee to assist with formulating plans and making recommendations to Administration and Property. It is also recommended that the Safety Committee be responsible for being the congregation's eyes and ears during worship services and other church activities. We are not asking them to be police officers or carry weapons. It might be medical professionals who could be part of

an organized response to an incident. It might be individuals locking doors or clearing exits. The Safety Committee would also assist in case of fire or medical emergency. Over the next few weeks, if you are interested in being part of the Safety Committee, please see one of us, one of the pastors or other members of the Administration and Property Committee (Cliff McIntyre, Christy-Lee Lowe, Nancy Seitz, David Temple, or Joe York). Unfortunately, given the age we live in, this will not be the last time you hear from us on this subject. Merry Christmas!"

HEALTH MINISTRY NEWS

Resolve to Eat These 10 Healthy Foods Often in 2019!

If you are in need of a New Year's resolution here is an option that could potentially help you to become healthier if you are not already taking advantage of 10 wonderful sources of nutrition. The following 10 foods are some of the healthiest because they meet at least three of the following criteria:

- Excellent source of fiber, vitamins, minerals and other nutrients
- High in phytonutrients and antioxidant compounds such as vitamins A, E, and beta carotene
- May help to reduce the risk of heart disease and other health problems
- Low in calorie density, meaning you get a larger portion size with fewer calories
- Are readily available

Almonds are packed with nutrients - fiber, riboflavin, magnesium, iron and calcium. Almonds have more calcium than any other nut. Also, one serving of almonds provides half of your body's recommended dietary allowance of vitamin E. Like all nuts, almonds are good for your heart.

Apples are an excellent source of pectin, a soluble fiber that can lower blood cholesterol and glucose levels. Apples can push the production of the "memory chemical" acetylcholine. Apples are also a good source of vitamin C which serves to protect the body's connective tissue from damage.

Blueberries, along with cranberries, are a rich source of phytonutrients - a group of compounds that may help prevent chronic diseases such as heart disease, diabetes and some cancers. These plant compounds may also improve short-term memory and promote healthy aging.

Broccoli, the champion of green vegetables, is a great source of calcium, potassium, folate, fiber and phytonutrients. It also gets the award for being a great source of vitamins A and C.

Red beans, including small red beans and dark red kidney beans, are good sources of iron, magnesium, phosphorus, potassium, copper and thiamin. They are also an excellent low-fat, low-calorie source of protein and dietary fiber and contain phytonutrients.

Salmon is an excellent source of omega-3 fatty acids, a type of fat that makes your blood less likely to form clots that may cause heart attacks. Omega-3s may also protect against irregular heartbeats, lower triglyceride levels and blood pressure and reduce the risk of stroke. Salmon is low in saturated fat and cholesterol and is a good source of protein.

Spinach is an excellent source of riboflavin, vitamin B-6, calcium, iron, magnesium, vitamins A and C and folate. The plant compounds in spinach may help keep your hair and skin healthy and boost your immune system.

Sweet potato, full of beta carotene which is converted to vitamin A in your body when eaten, may help slow the aging process and reduce the risk of some cancers. Sweet potatoes are also good sources of fiber, vitamins B-6, C and E, folate and potassium. Sweets are fat-free and relatively low in calories - one small sweet potato has just 54 calories. Of course, that is without the butter, brown sugar and nuts!

Vegetable juice is an easy way to include vegetables in your diet because it has most of the vitamins, minerals and other nutrients found in the original vegetables. Juices that include tomatoes are good sources of lycopene, an antioxidant that may reduce the risk of heart attack, prostate cancer and possibly other types of cancer. Be sure to choose the low-sodium varieties.

Wheat germ, the center of a grain of wheat, does for humans what it does for the new wheat sprout. This small part of the wheat seed is a highly concentrated source of nutrients including niacin, thiamin, riboflavin, vitamin E, folate, magnesium, phosphorus, potassium, iron and zinc. It also contains protein, fiber and some fat.

What better way to start the New Year than with a resolve to be healthier. Include these good foods in your daily diet and you will reap the benefits. Stay well as you look forward to a healthy 2019!

Drivers Needed

Are you able to drive a multi-passenger van? Are you available Friday evenings and Saturday mornings? If so, Room in the Inn could use your help. St. Andrew participates in this program, which provides overnight accommodations for homeless men. On scheduled Friday nights in November through March, six gentlemen arrive for dinner, spend the night, enjoy breakfast, and are sent off with a sack lunch on Saturday morning.

There are many ways to help with this ministry; one is serving as a driver. The driver picks up a van from Tennessee Car & Van Rental between 3:00-5:00 p.m. on Friday (the rental company closes at 5:00 p.m.). The driver proceeds downtown to pick up guests between 5:45-6:00 p.m. and brings them to church. On Saturday morning, the driver picks up our guests at 5:30 a.m. and returns them to the shelter by 6:30 a.m.

If the driver is willing, our guests can be taken to Waffle House for breakfast; this is coordinated with the dinner hosts on Friday evening when our guests arrive. The driver then refuels and returns the van. It is possible to be reimbursed for fuel and breakfast.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.' ... Then [Jesus] began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." (Luke 4:16-21).

Jesus referenced the Old Testament book of Isaiah a lot to explain his teachings and his life. The Church, from ancient times till now, has also turned to Isaiah to understand how Jesus could be the messiah. On Monday evenings we will be studying Isaiah, why it was so important to Jesus, and how it can help us understand his life and saving work.
