

FROM THE PASTOR

You probably have heard that this year, Ash Wednesday falls on Valentine's Day and Easter arrives on April Fools Day. It seems strange (and perhaps even a bit like a bizarre joke) for those events to coincide, especially since this hasn't happened in seventy-three years: not since 1945, before the end of WW II. One time – I read about this online – there was a one hundred forty-one year gap. That was the span between 1725 and 1866 – from over fifty years before the Revolutionary War began to a year after the Civil War ended. The next time Ash Wednesday falls on Valentine's Day and Easter on April Fools Day, we'll only have to wait until 2029.

But regardless of what is going on with this year's calendar, we do not anticipate these dates being in conflict at St. Andrew. The annual youth Valentine dinner and variety show will be on Saturday, February 10, and we will be observing our usual schedule on Ash Wednesday.

During the four Wednesdays after Ash Wednesday, we will share in "A Lenten Journey to the Easter Vigil." This comes from a resource our worship planners use, *Sundays and Seasons*. On each of these Wednesdays, an Old Testament reading appointed for the Easter Vigil will be our theme. As *Sundays and Seasons* observes, "Each reading offers a description of God, a metaphor of the resurrection, and a reference to baptism." So this will be a good way to prime the pump for Easter as we undergo our fast from baptism during Lent and reflect on baptism's significance in our life of faith. During these four midweek services, we will be using Evening Prayer or Vespers in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*.

Please join us for a simple meal of soup and sandwiches and for conversation any time between 5:30 and 6:40 p.m., beginning on Wednesday, February 21. Make a commitment to join us for midweek Lenten worship, which starts at 7:00 p.m.

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
WEDNESDAY SERVICES IN LENT February 21, 28, and March 7, 14, 21

FROM THE ASSOCIATE PASTOR

One of the "problems with the world today" that people bring up most frequently is how divided we are in terms of our opinions, beliefs, and experiences. But more than that: we can so easily insulate ourselves on our side of that divide. We can choose to read or hear only the news that supports our opinions; we can join online groups where everyone will tell us we are right; and we can choose to spend our time only with people who agree with us.

In these times Pastor Ron Bonner (Lutheran Church of the Atonement, Atlanta), borrowing from Martin Marty, talks about the importance of forming "heretical friendships" or friendships that are "outside our comfort zones." By becoming friends with people who think or live differently than we do, we can question, explore new ideas, and challenge each other within a relationship of care and trust rather through the unbending and distant fights of internet comments. We can talk through things with someone who thinks differently, but also knows us as a whole person, not just a single opinion.

Participation in the life of the church is one of the few places where these heretical friendships are encouraged. Here we gather together not around our common viewpoints, but around our common need for the grace given to us through Jesus Christ. And so here we have the opportunity to challenge one another and learn from one another in that context of friendship and grace. I'm blessed to see it all the time: at the Navigators breakfast, where men openly disagree with one another and still end their time together with a warm, "See you on Sunday!"; in Bible studies where people share differing opinions; in unlikely friendships that start in worship and then carry on into homes and restaurants.

I am thankful for this place where God is at work to both comfort and challenge us, and for the way God works through not only our relationship with God, but also our relationships with each other, to change our lives and the life of the world.

FROM THE PASTOR EMERITUS

At about the time I was ready to say "enough already" of these repetitious articles, I was rewarded with some positive feedback from one of our Inquirer Classes. To a person, those present complimented the congregation for being so welcoming. Many offered up the fact that they had never been greeted so warmly and enthusiastically as they were at St. Andrew! Maybe a broken record has some use after all. Maybe repetition is beneficial.

All I can say to the congregation is "Well done, good and faithful servant!" Keep up the good work. But before big heads get in the way, let's agree that our task is joyfully ongoing. More visitors come our way in ever-increasing numbers and we must be ever vigilant in our welcoming.

FROM THE COUNCIL PRESIDENT

Namaste

I have an effervescent, energetic, and extremely curious five-year-old named Alex. For years, we nicknamed him "Trouble," as the boy has the talent for incidental destruction to any medium. That is why it was a surprising spiritual lesson I recently learned from my son.

Alex, Emilene, and I went to the Christmas caroling event at the church. We met at the church with other families, gathered in our Christmas attire, passed around bells and song sheets, and waited for other families to arrive before we carpooled to our first caroling destination.

During the wait, Alex observed the portraits of our pastors hanging in the lobby area. Pointing to the portraits, Alex stated quite matter-of-factly, "That is God." Not knowing whether he was pointing to Pastor Pearson or Pastor Lippard's portrait, I asked him which one and what he said. He walked right up to Pastor Lippard's portrait, pointed again, and said clearly, "He is God." So, in a first humorous reaction to his mistake, I tried to gently correct him. While laughing and sharing this odd statement with Pastor Museus, she said she couldn't wait for the day when he looked at a female pastor and said the same. I agreed, and then I turned to Emilene and Alex and said, "Alex, you know, you are right." I pointed to each portrait of the pastors lined in a row and said, "He is God," "She is God," and continued around the room to point to everyone explaining that each person was from God. I told him we all came from God—we were all a part of God—we are all God energy.

Alex may not have understood, but Emilene was listening. She asked me about it later. I kept thinking about Alex's simple, bold declaration. The term "namaste" comes to mind. Very poorly translated by the Western world, it means "I bow to you." Spiritually in the Hindu faith, it is explained to mean "I honor the divine within you," or "the God within me recognizes, honors, and bows to the God within you." It is a greeting of familiarity and respect in Sanskrit. It is a valediction upon leaving.

Namaste may directly translate as "to bow," "to you," but the origin of it is na ma—not mine, but to you. It is an equalizing and respectful term among people meaning "my soul comes from and is the same as

yours." It is an empathic term that represents putting aside one's ego to truly care about the good (the God) of another. We are brothers and sisters, we are one, we are of the same divine substance. We are all divine energies from God and can recognize and respect one another as such.

This small term is powerful, but we do not have a similar word in our language or culture. In fact, we have no modern equivalent in a simple greeting to share the truth Alex pointed to when he said, "He is God." We have the option to set aside our pride, set aside our differences, set aside our prejudices to boldly greet with the same truth and respect one another. We can recognize the good in another and honor that good rather than judging. As a parent, as a wife, as an attorney, as a leader, and as a friend, I need to recognize in every greeting to another's beautiful soul that I bow to honor them and their good because it's not about me. It's namaste to all.

NURTURE COMMITTEE NEWS

Your Little Engine

It is early January, it is around nine degrees outside, and I am settled in front of my computer to decide what to say in a February newsletter article. February? January has just begun and my brain has just finished focusing on taking the Christmas decorations down, carefully packing them away, and storing them for next year. Looking around the room I spy one small ornament on a shelf that obviously has been overlooked in my gathering. This ornament, a small train engine, piques my interest and suddenly seems to relate to what I want to write about: heart month! In the children's Little Golden Book, The Little Engine That Could, it was with a lot of encouragement and effort that the little engine was able to pull several box cars full of toys over a mountain to take gifts to children in the valley below. This story delivers a message to small children as it speaks to perseverance, endurance, strength, and effort that the engine made to get the toys delivered as well as the joy that the village people felt when the engine arrived on the other side of the mountain.

Our February messages about hearts are similar to the story of the little engine. Valentine's Day tugs at our heart strings and our dollars with our efforts to put our best foot forward to make those significant in our lives feel loved and appreciated. Just as Valentine's Day is about love, choosing a lifestyle geared toward good health and prevention is also about love. It is the little engines, our hearts, that are often stressed the most when we do not fulfill our bodies' expectations of a healthy lifestyle. This magnificent little engine beats on average 115,200 times a day to carry us over the mountains or wherever we want to go, that is if we are physically fit to do so as the Little Engine was able to do.

Last February the title of my newsletter article was, "How is Your Heart?" During the past year what have you done to make sure that your heart/little engine is working at its best? How is your heart/little engine?

- 1. Are you aware of what you eat each day?
 Have you avoided chips, desserts and other
 nutrient low foods in favor of super foods
 such as berries, nuts, beans, fruits and
 vegetables that provide antioxidants,
 Omega-3 fats, vitamin and minerals and
 boasts to your immune system?
- 2. Is your body weight where it should be? Long term extra weight on your body can cause a multitude of heart and other body system problems.
- Have you had your flu shot this year? If not, it is not too late to get your flu shot as the flu can hang around until May. The Center for

- Disease Control and Prevention states that if you do get the flu you are more likely to recover faster if you have had a flu shot.
- 4. Are you getting enough sleep? According to a 2015 sleep study, individuals who sleep fewer than six hours a night are four times more likely to develop a cold than people who get seven hours or more.
- 5. Have you made regular physical activity part of your lifestyle? A general rule is to aim for at least 30 minutes of physical activity every day. Even brief bouts of activity offer health benefits. Strength training and aerobic activity both benefit your heart by controlling weight, reducing the risk of heart disease, cancer, type 2 diabetes, and improving mental health and mood.
- 6. Is life causing you to feel stressed? Daily stress can cause us to overeat, eat the wrong foods, lose sleep, gain weight and ultimately lead to illness including heart disease.
- 7. Do you follow the health guidelines for annual preventative health services? There is an ongoing debate regarding the need to see a physician annually for a physical exam. As this debate goes on, being proactive regarding your own health can help to keep your engine fine tuned.
- 8. Have you found a place to volunteer? There are multiple ways to volunteer at St. Andrew and in the community. We think of volunteering as helping others but it also can add mental and physical benefits for the volunteer. Volunteering activities get us moving and thinking at the same time by adding physical activity, increasing brain function and reducing stress. Volunteering can provide a sense of purpose and fulfillment and help to decrease the risk of depression.

Your heart/little engine has the potential for being a very efficient pump. Is your engine efficient or is there room for improvement in using perseverance, endurance and strength during Heart Month? By all means, give your little engine the opportunity to say, "I Thought I Could," and function at its best so that it can carry you over the mountain in 2018 and beyond!

NEWS FROM TRINITY/HOPE

Haiti Mission Trip - A Real Life Changer

Whether we're young or old, we can all look back over the years and see certain events or experiences that changed our lives forever. Of course, events like my wedding day and the birth of our children top my personal list, but for me, my first mission trip to Haiti with Trinity HOPE was almost as influential. It certainly changed my life forever. Like many overly-blessed Americans going on a short-term mission trip, I thought I was going there to impact the children we saw in a massive way. However, God had different plans and used the children in Haiti to touch my life far more than I could have ever touched theirs. Seeing firsthand how God used Trinity HOPE to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ through feeding programs in Christian schools, and how this noon meal was feeding the kids both physically and spiritually, re-calibrated my life. I knew I had to get more involved and I wanted that trip be the beginning of my journey and not the end. Now 35+ trips later, I still feel different every time I come back from Haiti. Each trip reminds me how all of God's children are beautiful and created in His image: how the church, as the body of Christ. is called to make a difference in the world, and how our culture in the United States can so easily cause me to get my priorities out of balance. 




